Our Rector Reflects on Her First Year at St. John's

Dear friends,

This is a good news, bad news, good news (and more good news) letter. The first bit of good news is that we have had an amazing year together!

We just finished the Sunday School year with a fun, new curriculum; we have a new bright, friendly nursery; we had an amazing concert series; a glorious Christmas, and festive Easter with choir and brass playing to a packed house for both services!

We had a wonderfully successful House Tour and Patrons' Party, Emily was ordained a deacon, and we've had baptisms, weddings, confirmations, celebrations of new ministries, and bid fond farewells to students and choir members moving on .



Even in the midst of struggle and sadness, it has been a year of new life and joy – resurrection has broken out all over!

The bad news is that Tanya Watt will be stepping down at the end of May as our interim parish administrator.

As many of you know, Tanya is married to Tim Watt, who is finishing his first year at Virginia Theological Seminary. Tanya is working on her PhD in public policy, and has been teaching classes remotely since she and Tim moved to the area last summer. When Tanya started with us in September, we expected that she would stay 2 or 3 months.

We quickly realized we couldn't possibly get through Christmas without her, and so she agreed to stay until we could find a permanent replacement.

I'm not sure that I will ever be able to thank Tanya for everything she has done *for me and for us* these past months. She started the day before Kimm's funeral, when I hardly knew which keys opened which doors. From her first day, I came to depend on Tanya's common sense, her creativity, her intellect, and

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Confirmation, an Affirming Step of Faith

Confirmation, as defined in The Book of Common Prayer is a pastoral rite, "a mature public affirmation of faith and commitment to the responsibilities of Baptism."

Three St. John's parishioners took that step into a

deeper and public spiritual commitment at a confirmation service at the Washington Cathedral. Senior Warden Avery Miller, Christo-Wilson pher and Charles C. Havnes were confirmed in the simple, but profound May 16 ceremony. To prepare, they had met with the Rev. Gini Gerbasi earlier in the month. Avery said for

her, confirmation was long overdue.

"It was on my "Bucket List" but I saw it more as a pressing obligation than a gift -- until I met Gini. She made me want to be an official member of a spiritual community that was welcoming and nourishing. When challenges have come our way, our family has always found enormous support and love within the walls of St. John's. And it sounds simplistic, but my confirmation simply confirmed for the world to see my joy and comfort as a member of the Episcopalian Church.

"And now St. John's has a confirmed Senior Warden which means I'll be twice as efficient!"

Charles explained his faith journey like this: "After Christopher and I found our church home at St. John's, I felt called to deepen and strengthen my connection to the Episcopal Church. Although my faith journey has included participation in other denominations and paths, I choose Confirmation instead of Reaffirmation or Reception because I wanted to affirm publicly my discipleship to Christ as a member of the Episcopal Church Christopher said, "Beginning last summer, when Charles and I first started attending St. John's and discovered Gini as a new friend and spiritual guide, I've felt a call to become more deeply involved in the life of the Episcopal Church. Though I went to

> weekly chapel at an Episcopal school in South Carolina from kindergarten through 12th grade - and have focused much of my education, research, and teaching on Christian history – I was never confirmed. My parents weren't churchgoers. So over the past year, having found a wonderful spiritual home at St. John's, I felt eager to become a full-fledged Epis-

copalian in my journey toward increased participation in and service toward the Church. Confirmation at the Cathedral was beautiful, especially Bishop Mariann Budde's sermon that urged us to imitate St. Peter in walking on water, taking risks to go where Christ calls us.

In her sermon, the Bishop explained the depths of spirituality. "Being a Christian--that is, being one who follows Jesus and tries to live according to his teachings and to pay attention to his Spirit at work in and around us all--has far less to do with how many times you show up in church on Sunday than it does with your openness to his invitation."

"When you hear it, to walk on water--that is, to be brave, and do the thing that as yet, you cannot do; to follow your heart; to accept what you'd do anything to avoid; to love when it costs something; to show up when you're rather run away. When that happens, and I assure you that it will. . . Pay close attention. And trust the one who calls you out will be

Rewinding the 84th G'town House Tour

The 84th Georgetown House Tour, held April 25, was a showcase of the generous spirits of the parish and the community – especially those who opened the doors of their home to about 1,000 people who joined us.

Despite the cloudy and cool day, the climate was sunny and warm among the some 150 volunteers serving tea in Blake Hall, selling tickets on the lawn, captaining and working as docents at the houses, directing traffic and tour buses, playing our impressive Cassavant Frères organ for visitors and counting receipts from ticket sales. Rev. Gini Gerbasi experienced her first House Tour as the new rector at St. John's and greeted tour guests as they entered the church.

The massive endeavor involves months of preparation and much volunteer talent:

- House Captains prepare write-ups for the tour booklet and recruit docents.
- Corporate sponsors and advertisers are secured and the glossy tour booklet is designed and printed.
- For the Patrons' Party, community co-chairs are recruited to help plan and carry out the event; Two thousand invitations are mailed and an 80-member host committee is assembled, all leading to the \$83,000 dollars that are raised in four months time.
- Hundreds of cookies and thousands of savory tea sandwiches are handmade by parishioners, who enjoy the goodies to the accompaniment of musical entertainment.

None of this could happen with the amazing energy of our volunteers. A special thank you to the GTHT Co-chairs **Barbara Wolf** and **Colman Riddell**. **Ron Ivey** deserves special recognition for chairing Sponsorship and Advertising in addition to his service as a vestry member of St. John's. **Nina Kaull**, our Tea Chair, once again planned and carried out a flawless event, and led an amazing team of volunteers.

Donating countless hours of work, those volunteer leaders included: Chair of Houses **Megan Motherway** and Marketing Chair **Alison Bates Fisher**, and **Kevin Shieves**, Parking Chair. Everyone's hard work, creativity, team spirit and love of St. Johns' is greatly appreciated.

There were ten spectacular houses on the tour this year, featuring widely ranging styles and designs and histories. Quality Hill on Prospect Street was a featured site and proved to be a compelling destination for our tour-goers anxious to see the elegant mansion built by John Mason, nephew of George Mason. St. John's parishioners **Isobel** and **Brian Cox** opened their lovely home to the tour, and our very own Gini dashed into action in securing a lovely home with stunning gardens after having visiting there following a baptism.

A fun feature of the tour is the Patrons' Party. This year, Georgetown resident **Debbie Winsor** hosted the April 22 event at her home on Dumbarton Street for more than 250 people attended. A thank you to the Patrons' Party co -chairs: **Amy Gross, Megan Paleologos, Amy Porter Stroh, Belinda Winslow,** and **Deborah Winsor**. Begun at the height of the Depression, the tour is also a fundraiser, representing a significant percentage of the church's annual budget. The funds are used for the maintenance and upkeep of our historic church, which is used not only as our place of worship, but used nearly daily by a variety of community groups. A portion of the revenue also funds our many outreach projects, which include the Salvation Army's Grate Patrol for the homeless, Saturday Suppers, and nonprofit organizations we support, which include organizations like the Georgetown Ministry Center, DC Volunteer Lawyers and Jubilee Jobs.

Along the tour route, Hyde-Addison Elementary School parents and students set up lemonade stands, which helped raise funds for the school. St. John's Church and Hyde-Addison enjoy a special relationship, which includes everything from after-school tutoring by parishioners to hosting school assemblies in the parish hall to parking provided to churchgoers by the school.

Next year's House Tour will be Saturday, April 23, 2016. It has always been our goal for this great St. Johns tradition, to have each and every parishioner involved as a volunteer. Planning begins now!

Cara Rockhill gave an amazing sermon on April 26. Here is an excerpt.

"As I stand before you today, I am at the end of one journey, and the beginning of another. If you had told me 3 years ago that I would be standing before you, in a pulpit that Francis Scott Key helped build. . I would have nodded politely at you then slowly backed away, because you are clearly crazy. But yet here I am.

The journey that I went on was interesting and unexpected. 4 years ago, I was barely a Christian. And now I stand before you a confirmed Episcopalian, who is in the process of being ordained as a Deacon. In the course of this journey, I have been, many times, on my knees crying out "My God, My God, why have you forsaken me? What am I doing here? Where do I go from here? What do you want from me?" But I have come out of this journey with a belief that God is with me, and you, always. **St. John's supports** *The Bishop Walker School*, the highly regarded school for boys. Those of us who dream of true equal opportunity for all expect that one day the boys at Bishop Walker School will receive as outstanding an education at Bishop Walker as do the boys at St. Albans or any of the other outstanding Episcopal Schools in the diocese. But making that dream a reality will take the financial investment of the whole community.

Prayerfully consider a donation to the school as an outward sign of our community's heartfelt response to the disparate opportunities available to children of color in our city. Envelopes are available to collect donations to the school. You can also mail a check to church with "Bishop Walker School" in the memo line. So far, St. John's parishioners have donated \$2,145 in support of this effort.

SATURDAY SUPPER — A Yummy Idea

HOW IT HAPPENED. In October 2013, Holy Trinity Catholic Church invited Bruce McPherson and other Georgetown churches to consider the possibility of feeding—every Saturday night year round—50-60 persons in our community lacking homes and often hungry. Word spread quickly.



By early November, six churches — Holy Trinity Catholic, Mount Zion and Dumbarton United Methodist, Georgetown Presbyterian, Jerusalem Baptist, and St. John's Episcopal — became a vital, inter-racial, ecumenical team. We met and discussed 'issues': Full-hot, or quick-bite takeaway meals? Mixed parish, or single parish teams? Adults only, or mixed age/family teams? Rotated location, or single site?

After two meetings, we voted: Full hot...single parish...mixed age/family style. When discussion seemed finished and quiet descended, Pastor Johnsie Cogman



of Mt. Zion spoke up, cheerily proclaiming: "No rotating sites! Mt. Zion will be the home for every supper. We can't have the brothers and sisters trying to keep track of our schedules."

78 DINNERS LATER. Since that meeting, the ministry has cooked and served 78 consecutive Saturday Suppers. Our



guests keep coming, many known now by name—racially diverse, and averaging 55 per supper, with about 10 women each night, and one intact family recently. Producing a supper requires 14 -16 volunteers to prepare meal items, set up/break down guest and buffet tables and chairs, prepare the food service and beverages/dessert tables, serve guests and bring around extra helpings.

While meals vary widely, they always include two main dishes, a favorite pasta, vegetable casserole, potatoes in some form, a green vegetable (broccoli...who knew!), bread and butter, salad, and a range of deserts. As St. John's is on duty the 1st Saturday of the month, it is our pleasure to serve a Big Birthday cake and ice cream to celebrate all birthdays volunteers and guests—coming up in the month ahead.

HOW WE DO IT. Ten days before each first Saturday, a "SignUpGenius" email goes out to St. John's 44-person mail list; volunteers select food items/amounts; some come and serve only. The time commitment is two 2 hours (4:15 p.m. to 6:15 p.m.) Together, volunteers and guests, offer a prayer thanksgiving. A gracious but organized efficiency provides pleasures of food and social interaction.

There's something holy going on here, a transformative rendering, making 'Us' and 'Them' into 'We.' There is no doubt: Where two or more are gathered in his name, there he is in the midst of us.
